ANAPHORA:

the repetition of a word or phrase at the beginning of successive clauses (cues reader that the repeated ideas are important)

EX: "We shall fight on the beaches; we shall fight on the landing grounds; we shall fight in the fields and in the streets; we shall fight in the hills!"

ANTITHESIS:

a contradiction of ideas or words within a balanced grammatical structure (is used to emphasize the intensity or confusion of the moment)

EX: "It was the best of times; it was the worst of times.

EPISTROPHE:

the repetition of the same word or groups of words at the end of successive clauses (is used to emphasize the importance of the repeated ideas-- to leave a lasting impression)

EX: "Don't you ever talk about my friends! You don't know any of my friends. You don't look at any of my friends. And you certainly wouldn't condescend to any of my friends!"

SITUATIONAL IRONY:

the oddness of a given situation (anunexpected outcome)

EX: If the president of Microsoft, Bill Gates, were to win a contest whose grand prize was a computer system.
