### **Chapter 14: "The Phosphorous Trap"**


#### **SUMMARY OF CHAPTER:**

The symbol of the light bulb stands for enlightenment.

This concept shows up in Chapter 14 because Holmes and Watson finally realize that the hellish hound is not a supernatural being, but rather an actual dog, so "enlightenment" is an appropriate concept to pair with this chapter.
