1. An article or publication retrieved from an electronic database

If you're citing an article or a publication that was originally issued in print form but that you retrieved from an online database that your library subscribes to, you should provide enough information so that the reader can locate the article either in its original print form or retrieve it from the online database (if they have access).

The generic citation form for a professional web site: Author(s). *Name of Page*. Name of Institution/Organization Affiliated with the Site (sponsor or publisher), Date of Posting/Revision. Medium. Date of Access.

The generic citation form for an article on a web site would look like this: Author(s). "Article Title." *Name of Web Site*. Name of Institution/Organization Affiliated with the Site (sponsor or publisher), Date of Posting/Revision. Medium. Date of Access.

3. An online reference work

BASIC THINGS TO REMEMBER

- <u>UNDERLINE</u> required items on bib. cards; *ITALICIZE* required items on Works Cited page.
- Avoid copying source citations listed on material printed from electronic sources unless they follow exactly the guidelines outlined on the previous pages, as well as in *Write for College*.
